2017 Descendants 75th Anniversary Reunion

The Descendants' 2017 reunion will be held during Ranger Rendezvous 2017 (RR17) the last week of June 2017, at the Hilton Garden Inn, Columbus, Georgia. Active duty Rangers of the 75th Ranger Regiment are going all out to support and promote RR 17 to celebrate the anniversary of the founding of modern day Rangers. We are hopeful that several World War II Rangers will be able to attend, and every effort will be made to accommodate any special needs they may have. This is their Reunion – a tribute to their accomplishments and sacrifices. Let's help get them there.

The Hilton Garden Inn is an extra nice facility located in a business park on a beautiful lake off US Highway 80 just a mile west of Columbus. It has ample room for all of our group functions and a large hospitality room opening onto a raised patio overlooking the lake.

Our group is invited to participate in all the RR17 activities sponsored by the 75th Ranger Regiment, including an airborne operation, a BBQ at the airport hangar, Ranger Hall of Fame ceremonies, and Change of Command ceremonies, all held at Fort Benning, just a few miles south of our hotel.

The Descendants' formal schedule begins with arrival on Tuesday, June 27 and ends with our banquet on Saturday evening, July 1. The Ranger airborne operation occurs on Monday June 26, and anyone wishing to attend that should plan to arrive early. We will have registration open for anyone wishing to come early for the airborne operation.

The spring newsletter will have more details of activities, which will also be posted on our website when the schedule is finalized.

World War II Ranger Database & Advisory Board

The Board of Directors of the Descendants has approved the concept of establishing a comprehensive digital database of WW II Ranger information. The concept is to develop a searchable web based digital library. It will be the one place where we will attempt to compile and preserve digital copies of all official WW II Ranger records, along with unofficial documents such as letters of correspondence, Rangers memorabilia, photographs, and other documents that Rangers and family members are willing to share.

The concept of the Database falls directly in line with three of the five mission statements of the Descendants:

- To perpetuate the history of the men
- To memorialize and perpetuate the memory of all Battalion Rangers
- To educate and inform those seeking information and history of the Rangers. This will be a legacy that our World War II Rangers will leave to generations that follow, people not yet born who will one day hear about the Ranger heroes of World War II, perhaps one of their ancestors, and they will want to know more. We know we are on the right track because the Daughters of the American Revolution are developing a digital library of the soldiers of the Revolution, a similar but much larger project.

Records of our WW II Rangers are scattered all across the country in various libraries and archives. Some are already available on-line to members of the Face book group, World War II Rangers and Descendants. Many are held in personal collections, and it is usually difficult for someone besides an expert historian to find specific information on an action involving their Ranger. Our goal is to bring this information into one place where it is accessible to the public. The database will in effect be our library. It is not a duplication of anything in existence, because there is no central collection of all WW II Ranger records. Will we ever get them all? Possibly not, but we can try!

We will not attempt to collect and preserve hard copies of anything. We will scan whatever documents we collect, assign keywords to each document to enable searching, and then file the digital copy on-line. The original copies of anything we file will be sent to another facility, yet to be named, for final permanent storage. Because the database, or library, will be on-line, we will maintain digital copies of the database on several hard drive backups in the event of a web crash.

Our project may take several years to complete. It will also take funding because much of this information is stored at libraries and facilities across the country. For the purpose of fund raising the Board of Directors of the Descendants of WW II Rangers has approved the concept of an Advisory Board, a group of senior active and retired Rangers and civilians who will assist in raising the funding to carry out the project. The Advisory Board will report to our Board of Directors and will have no authority whatsoever. They will be advisory only. The Descendants is a legal 503(c) 3 non-profit Foundation, and as such we are allowed to receive tax deductible donations from individuals and other foundations.

This is currently a project of the History Committee, and we have someone designated to represent each battalion. We will keep you informed as the concept develops into reality. Our Rangers will be proud that we are preserving their history and making it available to everyone. RLTW!

JAMES E. LUTON - 1F - MAY 16, 2016



James E. Luton, 91, of Oil City, PA., died at 7:28 A.M. Monday May 16, 2016 at home following a brief illness. Born Nov. 7, 1924 in Oil City, PA., he was the son of the late James & Florence Williams Luton. He was a veteran of the United States Army, serving during World War II, where he was a member of the 1st Ranger Battalion. James was held captive for 15 months in Germany as a P.O.W. He was awarded the Distinguished Unit Badge, the American Campaign Medal, Good Conduct Medal, World War II Victory Medal and the European African Middle Eastern Campaign Medal with 2 Bronze Stars and Bronze Arrowhead. James was married to Mary Pearl Kehrer on Sept. 6, 1946 and she preceded him in

DEATH ON AUGUST 27, 2004. MR. LUTON WAS THE OWNER / OPERATOR OF LUTON'S AUTOBODY IN TITUSVILLE FOR MANY YEARS, RETIRING IN 1989. RUGGIERO AS WELL AS JENNY WHITE AND HER HUSBAND JOSEPH WHITE. HE ALSO LEAVES SEVERAL NIECES AND NEPHEWS.

LEE MARTIN BROWN, 90 PASSED AWAY PEACEFULLY AT HOME ON TUESDAY NIGHT, JANUARY 12. HE WAS BORN JANUARY 29, 1925. HE GRADUATED FROM NEW HAVEN'S COMMERCIAL HIGH AND WAS DRAFTED INTO THE ARMY TO FIGHT IN WORLD WAR II. HE APPLIED AND WAS ACCEPTED INTO THE ELITE FIGHTING UNIT OF THE ARMY RANGERS. UPON COMPLETION OF HIS RANGER TRAINING IN GEORGIA, HE WAS DEPLOYED AS A MEMBER OF D-DAY'S LEGENDARY 5TH RANGER BATTALION. BROWN'S BATTALION STORMED OMAHA BEACH IN NORMANDY IN THE FIRST WAVE OF ASSAULTS ON JUNE 6, 1944. FOLLOWING THE BATTLE AT NORMANDY, HIS BATTALION JOINED GENERAL


PATTON'S 3RD ARMY FIGHTING IN THE BATTLE OF THE BULGE AND RACING ACROSS THE CONTINENT TO LIBERATE EUROPE. HE AND HIS BATTALION LIBERATED THE GERMAN CONCENTRATION CAMP, BUCHENWALD. BROWN EARNED MULTIPLE MEDALS AND CITATIONS FOR HIS ACTIONS DURING THE WAR. IN 2009, HE WAS CHOSEN BY THE PRESIDENT OF FRANCE AND WAS BESTOWED THEIR HIGHEST HONOR FOR VALOR, THE CHEVALIER (KNIGHT) OF THE FRENCH LEGION OF HONOR. LEE NEVER FORGOT ABOUT HIS BRIEF TIME IN GEORGIA DURING HIS RANGER TRAINING AND IN 1950, HE RETURNED TO MARRY HIS GEORGIA PEACH, FORSYTH COUNTY'S HELEN GRACE TRIBBLE. HE IS SURVIVED BY HIS BELOVED WIFE OF 65 YEARS HELEN, THEIR TWO SONS, DAVID AND PHIL, THEIR WIVES, SEVEN GRANDCHILDREN AND TWO GREAT-GRANDCHILDREN.

STORED IN GERMAN BANK VAULTS. HIS MILITARY AWARDS INCLUDE THE SILVER AND BRONZE STARS AND A PRESIDENTIAL UNIT CITATION. HE WAS RECALLED TO SERVICE DURING THE KOREAN WAR AND SPENT HIS CIVILIAN CAREER AS AN EXECUTIVE IN THE DEFENSE INDUSTRY. ROGER'S WAR EXPERIENCE IMPARTED A PROFOUND LOVE OF LIFE AND A CAN-DO DETERMINATION TO GIVE BACK TO HIS FAMILY, COMMUNITY AND COUNTRY. A COMMUNITY ACTIVIST AND PERENNIAL VOLUNTEER, HE WAS ACTIVE IN THE LIONS CLUB, THE AMERICAN LEGION AND VARIOUS CITY GOVERNMENT ORGANIZATIONS. HE SPOKE EXTENSIVELY ABOUT HIS EXPERIENCES TO COMMUNITY AND SCHOOL GROUPS, AND PARTICULARLY ENJOYED TEACHING MIDDLE SCHOOLERS ABOUT THE WAR, LIFE AND THE QUALITIES OF LEADERSHIP. HE WAS FOUNDER AND PRESIDENT OF THE N. VA TENNIS LEAGUE AND PRESIDENT OF THE FRIENDS OF THE W&OD TRAIL. HE WAS ACTIVE IN VETERANS' ORGANIZATIONS AND WAS A USO VOLUNTEER AND A GREETER OF HONOR FLIGHTS BRINGING HIS FELLOW VETS TO VISIT THE WWII MONUMENT. ROGER IS SURVIVED BY HIS WIFE OF 38 YEARS, LINDA; CHILDREN, ROGER, JR., LISA MATHIEU (STEPHEN), CHRISTA HYLAND AND DAUGHTER-IN-LAW, REBECCA NEIGHBORGALL; EIGHT BELOVED GRANDCHILDREN AND ONE GLORIOUS GREAT-GRANDDAUGHTER.

LEONARD A. PLOECKELMAN, 93, OF SHEBOYGAN, PASSED AWAY MONDAY, JULY 27, 2015, WITH FAMILY SURROUNDING HIM. LOCAL UNION #90 IN NEW BRITAIN, AND THE BUSINESS AGENT OF LOCAL #37 UNTIL RETIREMENT IN 1987. HE WAS A FAMILY MAN, AND AN AVID FISHERMAN AND BOSTON RED SOX FAN. HE IS SURVIVED BY HIS LOVING WIFE OF 68 BLESSED YEARS OF MARRIAGE: DAUGHTER, BARBARA (HARRY) LAUER, GRANDSON JEFF LAUER AND GRANDDAUGHTER KRISTEN LAUER (RALPH) GAUDIELLO.

ROY DAVIS - 6A - JANUARY 4, 2015



ROY DAVIS, 98, MOORHEAD, MN, FORMERLY GLYNDON, MN, DIED ON SUNDAY, JANUARY 4, 2015. ROY WAS BORN ON SEPTEMBER 4, 1916, IN BARNESVILLE, MN, TO WILLIAM AND LENA (ERICKSON) DAVIS. HE ENTERED THE U.S. ARMY IN FEBRUARY OF 1941 AND SERVED IN NEW GUINEA AND THEN IN THE PHILIPPINES ON DINAGAT, LEYTE AND LUZON ISLANDS WITH THE 6TH RANGER BATTALION. HE WAS DISCHARGED IN LATE 1945. ROY MARRIED EULA REA ON NOVEMBER 1, 1945 IN THE FIRST CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH IN MOORHEAD. THEY MADE THEIR HOME IN GLYNDON, MN, UNTIL OCTOBER OF

2000 WHEN THEY MOVED TO MOORHEAD. EULA DIED ON JULY 16, 2010. ROY WORKED FOR THE GREAT NORTHERN RAILROAD, RETIRING IN 1976. IN RETIREMENT HE VOLUNTEERED AT THE GOLDEN LIVING CENTER IN MOORHEAD. IN 2012 HE WAS RECOGNIZED BY THE CARE PROVIDERS OF MINNESOTA VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR, AND ALSO IN 2012, THE MINNESOTA ACTIVITY PROFESSIONALS VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR, AND THIS PAST FALL HE WON THE SOTY AWARD — SENIOR OF THE YEAR AWARD FOR THE FARGO-MOORHEAD AREA. HE WAS ALSO HONORED AS the longest member of the RSVP Retired Senior Volunteer Program of Fargo and Moorhead. Roy had been a life member of the VFW, and American Legion Club and Glyndon Congregational Church. WWII Ranger Raymond E. "Jack" Schuder 2016 Inductee to the Ranger Hall of Fame By: Ron Hudnell

In my opinion, every WWII Ranger belongs in the Ranger Hall of Fame for his service during WWII, for volunteering to be in a Ranger unit, for his combat beach landings and other combat activities. But I admit to a certain amount of bias! (Perhaps there will be success getting every WWII Ranger recognized with the work being done on the Congressional Gold Medal!)

Submitting the RHOF nomination package for WWII Ranger Schuder was a project that was spread over two+ years. Brian Leighton, a member of the Face book group for WWII Rangers & Descendants and a graduate of the Sam Houston State University ROTC Program, was the primary advocate for the nomination. He had been in their ROTC Counter Guerilla unit, a predecessor to their Ranger Company, and felt very strongly that Raymond Schuder as well as his wife, Vernon Schuder, should be recognized for their many contributions – time as well as financial – to the ROTC program at Sam Houston State University. And he had a lot support from the SHSU ROTC staff and graduates!

Brian began pushing hard in early 2014, so I contacted the Descendants board for feedback and advice. There was no disagreement, but since the Descendants of WWII Rangers was no longer a sponsoring organization for RHOF nominations, it meant that I had to seek another source for the nomination package submittal. I immediately went to Jerry Styles for advice and assistance, and he put me in contact with Bill Spies, a friend of WWII Rangers, and himself a member of the 2000 RHOF. Bill was extremely helpful in supplying the previous year's rules and conditions for RHOF submittals – which contained a list of active organizations which could submit nominations. From this material, it became evident that the submittal for Schuder had to be made by another member of the RHOF.

From early 2014 until late 2015, I mostly tried to gather as much information as I could on WWII Raymond Schuder. I had never met him. I had not read much about him. He was briefly mentioned in King's book, William Orlando Darby – a military biography. Most of the information that I had on Schuder came from Brian and a few newspaper articles (which contained some inaccurate information). And I also procrastinated... I did contact the wife of deceased WWII Ranger Schuder, Vernon Fitzgerald Schuder, in the nursing home. She has been described as a firecracker, and I think this is an accurate description as she wrote me a very personal and straightforward letter (she started her letter by saying she was old enough to call me by my first name)! I attempted contact with other relatives. Schuder's only child, Harold Schuder, had died in June 2008. So looking for information to fill in some holes in Schuder's service records, I wrote the daughter-in-law and grandchildren, but with no success. I talked to Schuder's stepson, Bill Fitzgerald, and got limited information about Schuder's later years. I also contacted Mark Evans to get some memories from his father, Warren "Bing" Evans, who had been with Schuder in the 1st Ranger Battalion as well as being Schuder's Company Commander in F Company, 3rd Ranger Battalion. Near the end of his time with us, Bing had no memories of Ranger Schuder and indications from Mark were that Bing as a 1996 RHOF inductee may have been willing to put his name on an honorary nomination package. Bing passed away before this could be accomplished...

So I went back to the Descendants as well others for advice and guidance. Lynn Towne, who prepared the 2009 RHOF nomination package for Jim Altieri, provided her wisdom on writing a nomination package. Seeking a sponsor for now an <u>Honorary</u> nomination, I sent out letters to other RHOF members – in the Face book group (MG (Ret) John Raaen – 2008 RHOF; Taft Yates – 2015 RHOF) as well as a West Point classmate (Gary Dolan – 2011 RHOF). I will forever be grateful to MG Raaen who very clearly stated his strong opinion that the nomination should be a standard nomination – not Honorary – and his willingness/pride in having his name on the nomination letter. Gary Dolan, an attorney who has vetted many nomination packages, gave me lots of useful guidance on the submission package and the nomination approval process.

In December 2015 with a nomination package deadline fast approaching, it became time to put some words on paper! Geoff Gentilini with Golden Arrow Research provided the documents detailing Schuder's military service before he was assigned to the 1st Ranger Battalion. Jim Schneider provided a copy of the orders transferring Schuder from the replacement battalion to his father's unit, the 1st Ranger Battalion, in January 1943. Steve Ketzer helped me by providing

a copy of the orders transferring Schuder from the 1st to the 3rd Ranger Battalion in June 1943. Paul Lohmann, Ranger tabbed and with the ROTC program at Sam Houston State University from 2002 – 2011 (excepting some deployments to Afghanistan), provided Schuder's discharge document, the nomination photograph as well as scans of many other materials from the Schuder shadowbox at the HEARTS Veterans Museum in Huntsville, TX. The Maneuver Center of Excellence Library at Ft. Benning provided the After Action Report for the 3rd Ranger Battalion which verified Schuder's post-Cisterna situation as MIA, and the archived Records of WWII Prisoners of War verified Schuder's status as a POW. The financial department at Sam Houston State University provided documents and verified the scholarship support by Raymond and Vernon Schuder to eligible candidates in the ROTC Schuder's Rangers. Julie Fulmer and Lynn Towne provided copies of many Reunion booklets and RBA newsletters from which many references and articles on Schuder were gleaned. The American Ex-Prisoner of War staff in Arlington, TX verified Schuder's membership in that organization.

The nomination package was prepared and forwarded to MG Raaen for his review and approval. Thankfully, he only had a few suggestions and improvements! The nomination package was then forwarded to the responsible department within the 75th Ranger Regiment for their recording and distribution to voting members.

Materials from the nomination package included (italics added):

Biographical information

Raymond Schuder was born 20 February 1919 in Concho County in southwest Texas. The 1930 census shows that his father Robert was from Germany and his mother Bessie was from Mississippi. He was in a large family with five brothers and a sister. Schuder was 10 years old at the beginning of the Great Depression, and this may be the reason that he only completed six years of formal schooling at age 16 at Millersview School, Millersview, Texas. His civilian occupation in 1935-1941 before enlistment was reported to be farming having worked on various farms and ranches using both motorized equipment as well as breaking and riding horses, and branding cattle. Schuder learned to survive at a young age.

Raymond Schuder enlisted in the Army at age 21 on 13 January 1941 at Ft. Sam Houston, San Antonio, Texas. Private Schuder was first assigned to the Service Company of the 141st Infantry Regiment, and later assigned as an Infantry Rifleman. PFC Schuder was transferred overseas leaving the US on 13 January 1943 and arriving to Company C, 7th Replacement Battalion, 1st Replacement Depot in North Africa on 26 January 1943. He was transferred from that replacement unit via Special Order 23, dated 30 January 1943, to the 1st Ranger Battalion then at Port-aux-Poules, Algeria. PFC Schuder along with 99 other enlisted men and five officers were the first replacement volunteers to join the 1st Ranger Battalion. Most of these replacements were organized into "George" or G Company for training and instruction which would only be for a week before the battalion was on the move. PFC Schuder eventually was assigned to A Company of the 1st Ranger Battalion in which he served with battlefield-promoted LT. Warren "Bing" Evans (RHOF 1996).

PFC Schuder along with the 1st Ranger Battalion was transported to Gafsa, Tunisia for a harassing, raiding, and reconnaissance mission near Sened Station. LTC Darby selected A Company as one of the three 1st Ranger Battalion companies for the 10-12 February 1943 mission, so this was PFC Schuder's first combat experience.

PFC Schuder's second combat experience with A Company of the 1^{st} Ranger Battalion was on 20 March 1943 at El Guettar, Tunisia at which the Rangers made a difficult combat march over terrain thought to be navigable by the Italian enemy. The 1^{st} Ranger Battalion was awarded the Presidential Unit Citation for this action.

In June 1943, the 1st Ranger Battalion at Nemours, Tunisia was segmented into three groups with each group to be the foundation for a new Ranger Battalion. A and B Companies would be the nucleus of the new 3rd Ranger Battalion with MAJ Dammer (RHOF 1997) as the Battalion Commander and CPT Schneider (RHOF 1992) as the Executive Officer. On Special Order 64 dated 3 June 1943, PFC Schuder was transferred to F Company, 3rd Ranger Battalion. Training was continued with emphasis on amphibious landings to prepare for the Sicily invasion.

PFC Schuder made his first assault landing at Licata, Sicily on 10 July 1943 for the capture of Porto Empedocle – 25 miles west of Licata – and later marched to Messina. The second assault landing by now T/4 Schuder was on 9 September 1943 at Maiori (Salerno). The 3rd Ranger Battalion then seized and held the critical Chiunzi Pass for eight days before being relieved. The 3rd Ranger Battalion received a Presidential Unit Citation for their fight to hold the Sorrento Peninsula. The third beach assault landing by SGT Schuder was at Anzio on 22 January 1944. During the later Cisterna operation on 30 January 1944, SGT Schuder was listed as Missing In Action with most other 3rd Ranger Battalion soldiers. He, along with the other captured Rangers, was marched through the streets of Rome, trucked to a POW camp at Florence, and then transported by boxcar to permanent POW Stalag 3B at Furstenberg, Prussia.

While at the German POW camp Stalag 3B, SGT Schuder attempted several escapes with each resulting in capture and punishment. He was also reportedly approached by the POW camp commander about his German surname, and offered special treatment if he would collaborate. He refused and was again punished. SGT Schuder is listed in the national archived POW records.

SGT Schuder is arrived back in the US on 16 June 1945. SSG Schuder was honorably discharged at Hot Springs, Arkansas on 21 October 1945. Raymond Schuder returned to his wife and home in Millersview, Texas to work in oilfields and with cattle. His only child Harold Schuder was born 25 July 1946 (now deceased). Twice divorced, Raymond Schuder married for a third time on 24 December 1965 to Vernon Fitzgerald – a graduate from Sam Houston State University (SHSU), a writer, and a music teacher in Texas public schools. She wrote, "I was married to Raymond Schuder for a really GREAT thirty one years! All happy ones."

Raymond Schuder was a good Ranger during WWII, survived the POW camps and attempted escapes, but his love for the Rangers continued after his discharge. It is not known when Raymond Schuder joined the WWII Ranger Battalions Association (RBA), but it was before 1975 when he was the Jr. Vice President for the national RBA organization. He was also the Rudder

Chapter President for the RBA during 1980-1982. He was a recipient of the coveted William O. Darby Award in 1988 for his contributions to the RBA. His name (and later that of wife Vernon) is mentioned many times in the RBA newsletters from 1988 – 2002. After a trip to Ft. Benning in 1983, Raymond Schuder developed an intensive "Ranger training" program with the ROTC Department at SHSU - conducting speed marches, using his lakeside property for amphibious landings, and night training. According to the SHSU records, he and his wife also entered into a financial agreement in 1987 to endow an annual scholarship up to \$500 to a financially-needy Ranger Company student. They also personally presented annual cash awards and "Commando" knives to top Ranger Company graduates. In May 1989 Raymond Schuder was presented a special plaque by the Military Science Department for his many contributions to the ROTC Ranger Company, which became known as "Schuder's Rangers."

The July 1989 RBA newsletter noted Schuder suffered with "a body that was sorely wounded in Italy, and whose back is scarred from beatings in German prison camps, and now whose abdomen is laced with scars from the surgeon's knife...". His wife wrote, "He would have bad dreams, and would try to move as if trying to run and would say 'Germans chasing me.'" Schuder was on 100% disability through the Veterans Administration. He died on 17 September 1996 while recovering from an aneurysm. Schuder is buried with a private tombstone engraved with the RBA Ranger scroll. His wife continued honoring his Schuder's Rangers with cash awards, Commando knives, and special "spending money" until her death on 7 November 2014.


Staff Sergeant Raymond "Jack" Schuder is inducted into the Ranger Hall of Fame for his World War II combat efforts during sustained actions with the 1st Ranger Battalion and the 3rd Ranger Battalion; his many attempted escapes from German POW Camp Stalag 3B in Furstenberg, Prussia; his many contributions to the Ranger Battalions Associations; and his significant financial and time donations to the training of future U S Army Ranger officers. SSG Schuder was an infantryman in A Company of the 1st Ranger Battalion, and participated in the El Guettar raid for which the 1st Ranger Battalion received a Presidential Unit Citation. SSG Schuder was later in F Company of the 3rd Ranger Battalion, and participated in the capture and defense of the Chiunzi Pass and Sorrento Peninsula for which the 3rd Ranger Battalion received a Presidential Unit Citation. SSG Schuder participated in three combat beach landings — Licato, Sicily; Maiori (Salerno), Italy; and Anzio, Italy. Surrounded by overwhelming German forces, SSG Schuder was captured at Cisterna along with most of the 3rd Ranger Battalion. After his capture, he continuously displayed Ranger drive and a commitment to escape from the German POW camp at Stalag 3B in Furstenberg, Prussia, and suffered from harsh beatings after each unsuccessful attempt. SSG Schuder continued to support the Ranger name and causes after his discharge from the Army in October 1945 by joining and leading within the World War II Ranger Battalions Association. SSG Schuder was awarded the coveted William O. Darby Award for his contributions to this Ranger association in 1988. He also developed a rigorous Ranger training program for the ROTC students at Sam Houston State University using his own funds, property and time to properly instruct the ROTC cadets on Ranger combat actions. He, along with his wife, made significant financial donations to the Sam Houston State University in order to endow an annual scholarship for needy students within the Sam Houston State University Ranger Company, which to his honor became known as "Schuder's Rangers." SSG Schuder lived the Ranger Creed. He was, and through his legacy will forever be, a Ranger who led the way.

SUCCESS!!! Word was received back in early May that WWII Ranger Raymond E. "Jack" Schuder had been approved for induction into the Ranger Hall of Fame at the 14 July 2016 ceremony! Bill Fitzgerald, stepson, traveled to Ft. Benning to accept the RHOF medallion. Schuder's grandson, Kurt Schuder and his wife Jennifer were also at the ceremony. There were at least three attendees affiliated with the Sam Houston State University ROTC program at the ceremony – Paul Lohmann who provided so much information for the package, Pat Dardis – a ROTC graduate who later flew Ranger training missions, and Beau Hughes, another SHSU ROTC graduate and a Special Forces veteran. David Williams and Andrea Buchanan from The Descendants of WWII Rangers organization were also in attendance at the ceremony as they were on a Ft. Benning 2017 Reunion site visit. They also were able to take Kurt and Jennifer to the nearby Ranger Monument and the WWII Ranger Memorial.

Bill Fitzgerald gave Schuder's RHOF medallion to Paul Lohmann so it could be added to the other Schuder materials at the HEARTS Museum in Huntsville, TX. My only regret in this event is that Schuder's wife Vernon did not live long enough to see her husband honored for the efforts that they both put into the ROTC "Schuder's Rangers" Program at Sam Houston State University. WWII Ranger Schuder provided the knowledge, training, energy, enthusiasm, and property and Vernon helped with the financial contributions which continued on even after Raymond's death. They were a very powerful Ranger team.

Vernon passed away on November 7, 2014. May she rest in peace and with these words from the current Cadet Officer-in-Charge of the Schuder's Rangers, Cadet Mathew Saye "The legacy that SSG Raymond Schuder has left behind at Sam Houston State University is extraordinary. All the Cadets who go through the Schuder's Rangers program here excel at everything they do for the Bearkat Battalion and in their Army careers. Many of the alumni who participated in Schuder's Rangers have gone into the active duty army and successfully completed ranger school and participated in the best ranger competition. I am only a third year cadet at Sam Houston State University, but Schuder's Rangers has taught me to be good at what you want to do, you have to work hard for it. Also for you to get better and proficient at anything you constantly need to be learning and adapting. A big thing about Schuder's Rangers is passing down this tradition of excellence, proficiency and character to all those who want to be a Schuder's Ranger."


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

Ranger Hall of Fame – 2016

Brigadier General William Ross Bond

William R. Bond, born in 1918, was a native of Relay, Maryland. Bond graduated from the University of Maryland with a bachelor's degree in political science and history. Bond entered the Army in 1940 and joined the First Ranger Battalion prior to the invasion of Sicily in 1943, serving through the Rangers' action at Chuinzi Pass as a platoon leader in Company A. Captain Bond then commanded Company 1/A through the battle at Cisterna where he, among hundreds of other gallant Rangers, was captured by the Germans. Because of his combat experience Captain Bond accompanied the Ranger scouts leading the infiltration to Cisterna even though the rest of the scouts were from 1/F.

Captain Bond was held as a Prisoner of War for eleven months at Oflag 64 in Szubin, Poland with most of the other Ranger officers captured at Cisterna. In January 1945, as the Russian armies fought their way into Poland, Captain Bond escaped with the commander of the First Ranger Battalion, Major Jack Dobson, and five others finding refuge with a Russian armored column. Captain Bond was awarded a Silver Star for his magnificent leadership on the field of battle at Cisterna.

After World War II Bond's army career was spectacular. He graduated from the Army War College and other senior service schools. His first tour of duty in Vietnam was in 1959-60 as an advisor. On his second tour in Vietnam Brigadier General Bond was the commander of the 199th Infantry Brigade, a unit known as the "Redcatchers". One of their Long Ranger Reconnaissance teams, Troop D of the 17th Cavalry, was ambushed and over-run about 70 miles northeast of Saigon. True to his habit of leading from the front, BG Bond landed his helicopter near the action to organize a search party. On 1 April 1970, as BG Bond exited his helicopter he was shot by a sniper and died shortly thereafter.

BG William Bond was the first U.S. general killed in ground fighting. Four other generals died in aircraft crashes. A funeral service for BG Bond was held at Arlington National Cemetery, and his body is interred at Stockbridge Cemetery, Stockbridge, Massachusetts. BG Bond was inducted posthumously into the Ranger Hall of Fame at Fort Benning, Georgia on July 14, 2016. RLTW.

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
